## 1. Introduction

The last 12 months have been an exciting period for ESRC Centre research at IFS. The new Centre started on 1 October and was launched with a well-attended public event at which Paul Boyle (ESRC), Alan Auerbach (Berkeley), David Ramsden (Treasury) and Evan Davis (BBC) spoke welcoming the new Centre and noting the impact our research has in the academic, business and policy communities. Richard Blundell and Carl Emmerson highlighted the central role the ESRC Centre funding and infrastructure plays within IFS and outlined the key elements of the Centre's research agenda for the next five years.

This report covers the final six months of the previous Centre contract and the first six months of the new Centre. This has been a key period for our research and for realising the impact of our research. We have produced new scientific results across the broad range of areas covered by the Research Centre and have also laid the groundwork for many more that we hope to develop over the course of the next five years. With an election and two Budgets, there has been a huge demand for our expertise in the policy debate. In addition, this year saw the successful launch of the Mirrlees Review of tax design and reform.

In terms of the key people involved in the strategic operation of the Centre, Robert Chote, the IFS Director, stood down on 1 October to become head of the newly formed Office for Budget Responsibility and was replaced by Carl Emmerson as Acting Director. On 1 January, a new IFS Director, Paul Johnson, was appointed. Paul was formerly Head of Microeconomic Research at HM Treasury and is already playing a major role in the communication and development of the research at the ESRC Centre. In addition to this, we have appointed Professor Imran Rasul (UCL) as a new Research Fellow at the Centre to take forward our work on risk-taking behaviour and social networks. We see this as particularly relevant for improving our understanding of education and occupational choices as well as specific risky behaviours by adolescents and young adults. Finally, we have also brought Dr Hamish Low (Cambridge), an existing Research Fellow, more closely into group-directing of our research programme in order to strengthen our work on dynamic models.

## 2. Impact and Highlights

Over the course of the year, we have made extensive research progress and engaged in numerous activities delivering both scientific and policy impact. Due to the particular timing of this Annual Report, these outputs relate both to activities initially planned in the final 'Forward Look' for the previous Centre grant and to those outlined in the 'Research Proposal' for the new Centre. This reporting period was a particularly hard period for which to choose only two examples of impact. With an election and two Budgets generating extensive policy debate and reform, the demand for commentary and evidence from Centre researchers was particularly high. In this section, we have chosen not to highlight the extensive impact we had on the day-to-day debate on the design, reform and operation of policy, which this year spanned all areas of government economic policy including direct taxes and benefits, indirect taxes, corporate taxes and government spending. Full details are well-documented in the Outputs and KPI sections of this report.

### 2.1. Economic and Societal Impact

- Our work on early life development and interventions to promote the accumulation of human capital has had a huge international impact this year. Our project on piloting a novel intervention on Early Childhood Development in Colombia has engaged with Colombian policymakers to discuss their strategy in this field and design an intervention that is explicitly scalable at the national level in a cost-effective way and can be delivered within the network of an existing government programme. These discussions led to a high-level event attended by the President of Colombia, high-level government officials and civil servants from Colombia and other Latin American countries. Orazio Attanasio and Costas Meghir attended to discuss the issues and evidence, along with other local and international experts including Professor James Heckman. Domestically, our work on the importance of the home learning environment in early childhood development featured prominently in Frank Field's Independent Review on Poverty and Life Chances, and we have also met with officials working on the forthcoming social mobility strategy to discuss our results. IFS researchers were also invited to present their findings on the relationship between parents' marital status at birth and early childhood outcomes to the Ministerial Task Force on Childhood and Families in the Cabinet Office in November.

- Our work on the principles of tax and tax credit design led to a number of important policy impacts this year. Following on from the Mirrlees Review, the Treasury Select Committee launched its own inquiry into the 'principles which should underpin the tax system'. On 25 January 2011, the committee began by taking oral evidence from the Mirrlees Review team, followed by a panel of experts from the industry. The research also helped to stimulate new reviews of the tax system by the Dutch Parliament and by the EU Tax Commissioner. Further impacts of the Mirrlees Review research could also be seen with regard to specific tax policies. As one key example, Centre researchers played a key role in the debates surrounding the proposed introduction of the Universal Credit, for which the thinking draws directly on work published as part of the Mirrlees Review. Centre researchers presented a preliminary analysis of the likely winners and losers and an assessment of the impact on work incentives at a briefing event at IFS and gave oral evidence to the Work and Pensions Select Committee, to MPs and to members of the House of Lords at a breakfast meeting of the All-Party Parliamentary Group for Social Science and Policy.

## 2.2. Research Progress

- We have now developed and estimated a baseline model of lifetime labour supply in the presence of tax credits and other important elements of the tax and benefit system. This is a dynamic model where individuals accumulate human capital through experience. This development represents a major empirical breakthrough that will lead to both policy impact and further research highlights. As examples, we will now be able to simulate counterfactual policies and better understand the implications of tax credits for employment and human accumulation as well as their welfare effects. By integrating the model with educational choices, we will be able to improve our understanding of how welfare policy affects human capital investments.
- This year we made substantial progress in the collection of individual-level data on expectations, risk and intertemporal preferences which will form the raw materials for key parts of the research identified in the Research Proposal for the new Centre. With the aid of co-funding from an ESRC small grant to cover survey development costs and lottery prize money, we have now successfully completed the collection of data on risk and time preferences from lottery choice experiments carried out on a sample of 1,000 older people in England. In addition, we have designed and implemented survey questionnaires aimed at eliciting the probability distribution of future incomes, the returns to education, and the returns to small investments in Mexico, Colombia, Mongolia and India. In the case of Colombia we have also collected data on risk attitudes, patience and information, whilst in the case of Mongolia and India we have for the first time experimented with measures aimed at assessing the degree of asymmetric information among members of micro-credit groups.

## 2.3. Scientific Impact

- We have developed a new methodology for relating microeconomic elasticities to observed macroeconomic responses of labour market outcomes to tax reforms. This research, formulated in the life-cycle framework and allowing for different responses at the extensive (whether to work) and intensive (how much to work) margins, is already widely influential and widely cited, having been presented at a special invited session at the American Economic Association annual meetings (January 2011). It will be published in the May issue of the *American Economic Review*.
- A second important piece of work, forthcoming as the Schumpeter Lecture in the *Journal of the European Economic Association*, looks at the importance of house prices in determining aggregate fluctuations in consumption by aggregating the behaviour of individual consumers in a life-cycle model. This work represents the output of a series of projects aimed at using numerical techniques to solve sophisticated life-cycle models to address a number of policy-relevant issues, ranging from the effect of house prices on consumption, to the taxation of savings, to the interaction of labour supply and savings. As part of this series of projects, we also published a critical review of the literature on the life-cycle model and its use and implications for policy analysis in the *Journal of Economic Literature*.

### 3. Progress against Objectives

We have made good progress against the research themes and milestones that we set out in our Forward Plan. There is insufficient space to detail progress against all milestones. Instead, we highlight a few examples of research progress under each of the main scientific sections of our research plan and then move on to discuss capacity-building initiatives.

#### *Wages, human capital and education*

- We constructed and estimated an equilibrium model of the labour market with search frictions and production complementarities.
- We continued our study of conditional cash transfer programmes in developing countries and used structural models of education choices to estimate the impact of recent changes to the structure of grants offered by a large conditional cash transfer programme in Mexico.
- We started to analyse the baseline data collected within our Early Childhood Development intervention in Colombia. One important spin-off of this has been a project on measuring cognitive development of very young children.
- We used models of lifetime earnings processes and the returns to higher education to carry out a detailed analysis of the government's latest round of announcements about the funding of higher education following the Browne Review in the autumn of 2010.
- Using discontinuities caused by date-of-birth admission rules, which mean that some children in England born one day apart may start full-time schooling up to one year apart, we estimated the impact on welfare receipt and employment patterns amongst lone parents receiving welfare of a youngest child being eligible for full-time schooling.
- We fully developed and estimated a model of human capital accumulation and lifetime labour supply in the presence of tax credits and other important elements of the tax and benefit system.

#### *Labour supply, health and retirement*

- We carried out a detailed analysis of lifetime labour supply responses by age and demographic composition and documented the efficiency gains from basing taxes on the ages of adults and children.
- We built models that combine FES and FRS data to estimate the labour supply responses of married couples in the last 30 years in order to understand the extent to which changes in benefits and taxes have contributed to the changes we see over time.
- We documented the evolution of labour supply in the last 40 years in the US, the UK and France, highlighting the relative importance of the extensive and intensive margins in explaining the overall changes in total hours worked. We developed a new methodology for relating micro to macro responses to tax reforms on labour market outcomes over the life cycle.
- We carried out a distributional analysis of the VAT reforms and the full package of tax and benefit changes announced in the Emergency Budget and gave oral evidence on this to the Treasury Select Committee and the All-Party Parliamentary Group for Children.
- We carried out a distributional impact analysis of public spending and documented in depth what is and is not known about the redistributive effects of public sector activity. Centre researchers briefed senior HMT civil servants and their analysis was directly influential in the way in which this issue was subsequently taken up and modelled in the Spending Review consultation document.
- We constructed a tax and benefit simulation model for Mexico and used it to estimate the effects of tax reform options with and without allowing for behavioural responses to tax changes.
- We adapted the IFS TAXBEN model to run on data from the English Longitudinal Study of Ageing (ELSA) and modified the tax and benefit simulation code in order to model disability benefit entitlements using the detailed information on individual health and disability that is available from the ELSA data.
- We embarked on the first stages of a long-term agenda of building and estimating a stochastic dynamic programming model of retirement and wealth accumulation at older ages in the presence of pension incentives and health shocks using ELSA data.
- We continued our work on international comparisons of morbidity and mortality at older ages with a number of publications having broad interdisciplinary scientific and policy impact. This work fed directly into the US National Academy of Science panel evidence volume and report on divergent trends in longevity published this year.

### *Savings, housing and consumer behaviour*

- We developed a model of revealed preference and consumer demand that allows for a distribution of tastes across goods and fully non-parametric responses to price and income effects. We also developed a general method for imposing and testing inequality and shape restrictions in consumer behaviour.
- We used EFS data to show that the restrictions on spending patterns implied by intertemporal models with a constant elasticity of intertemporal substitution are rejected by the data. We carried out a detailed study of the overall performance of standard life-cycle models of consumption and saving more generally and looked at the ways in which such models could be made more realistic when viewed from the perspective of the requirements of policymakers.
- We continued our previous work on modelling aggregate demand for housing. This work constitutes the first building blocks for our attempt to model house prices in a general equilibrium framework.
- We analysed risk sharing in rural Colombia, relating the ability to insure idiosyncratic risk to the presence of effective networks and developing models of risk sharing with imperfectly enforceable contracts.
- We constructed a general equilibrium model of the US economy to look at the consequences of changes in demographic patterns for the financing of Medicare.
- We coordinated an *Economic Journal* symposium on cognitive ability, financial literacy and savings. This brought together new international evidence on the relationship between financial literacy, numeracy and various savings and pension outcomes.
- We analysed spending on household fuel, showing evidence of a strong labelling effect on Winter Fuel Payments. Related work on fuel spending identified a reduction in food spending during periods of cold weather for the poorest, suggesting an inability to smooth expenditures on necessities in the short run.
- We delivered a presentation on 'Fiscal Measures to Improve Diet' to the Associate Parliamentary Food and Health Forum. The meeting was held in Parliament and parliamentarians, policymakers, and representatives from industry and various health groups were present.

### *Firms and corporate behaviour*

- We estimated the impact of corporate taxes on the location of patents around the world, considering source- and residence-country taxes, and controlling for the potential non-tax benefits to the firm that arise through locating patents in different locations.
- We investigated how well different types of policies – information campaigns, taxes and regulations – are able to counteract some of the ways in which food markets might fail to deliver optimal outcomes. We also considered some of the implementation issues associated with targeting different consumers and anticipating firms' strategic responses.
- We estimated the effects of a tax on saturated fat on food purchasing behaviour in an oligopolistic pricing model of food.
- We analysed the effects of minimum alcohol prices and showed that such a policy would transfer substantial sums from consumers to the retailers and manufacturers of alcohol, in contrast to increases in alcohol taxes which largely result in transfers to government in the form of tax revenue.

### *Capacity-building initiatives*

- We recruited one research economist and one PhD scholar and hosted seven student internships.
- We retained 22 Research Fellows, 20 Research Associates and 52 International Research Associates.
- One Centre scholar, Andrew Shephard, completed his PhD and took a faculty position at Princeton. He was also selected for the prestigious *Review of Economic Studies* European Tour meetings.
- The Centre continued to host a large number of both short- and long-term visitors and an exchange programme was initiated with CPB Netherlands Bureau for Economic Policy Analysis.
- During the General Election campaign, Centre research staff gave extensive briefings to journalists in print, broadcast and online media to prepare them for coverage of economic issues. They also spent time at the BBC in advance of both Budgets and the Comprehensive Spending Review, to assist journalists with the economic background and to help educate and inform the wider community.
- We organised a joint Public Economics seminar series with STICERD (LSE). Seminars were delivered by international experts, and attracted a wide range of junior and senior participants from around the UK.

#### 4. Key Performance Indicators (KPIs)

During the year, 35 journal articles were published or forthcoming and 34 working papers were produced. Centre staff presented 174 papers at conferences. We wrote 42 non-academic reports and briefings, 35 web 'Observations', and 23 Impact vignettes which were published online illustrating the impact of Centre-funded research on society.

We have met or surpassed the targets indicated in all dimensions. KPI targets related to Literature, Capacity Building, Collaborations, Financials and Public Lectures/Seminars were all broadly met, and new targets have been proposed in one area – International Collaborative Research Projects – where we feel the old targets do not now reflect our current agenda.

The one area where we saw major overshooting with regard to previous targets was in Communications including media coverage, where we achieved over 2,400 instances of newspaper coverage (target 1,000) and 1.14 million unique website visitors (target 1 million). In addition, we launched a Twitter feed that attracted over 2,000 followers within the first two months (no previous target). We are delighted with these numbers but they are no doubt partly a reflection of the sustained media and public interest in tax reform and broader economic policy brought about by the election and two Budgets, all of which took place in a time of major fiscal austerity. As such, whilst we will of course endeavour to sustain these levels of communication in the coming years, we are hesitant to increase the targets for the coming year from their 2010/11 levels by too much.
