



Minimum wages: further increases after 2020?


























What was announced yesterday?



Government will announce post-2020 remit for Low Pay Commission in Budget 2019

Professor Arindrajit Dube to "undertake a review of the international evidence on the employment and productivity effects of minimum wage rates"...

..."to consider the implications for future minimum wage policy in the UK, bearing in mind the aspirations the government set out in Budget 2018 to end low pay in the UK."

Minimum wage boosted wages at bottom of wage distribution

Risks of a higher minimum wage



Much of the academic research into minimum wages to date has found little or no impact on employment

Consistent with employers having a degree of "market power"

Irrespective of this, there will be a point beyond which a higher minimum wage causes significantly higher unemployment


Nobody knows where this point actually is

Government asked for a review of the international evidence on the impact of minimum wages

Minimum wage as a proportion of full-time median hourly wage, industrialised countries, 2017




Notes: Fraction of hourly pay amongst full time employees (not all employees age 25+). Source: IFS calculations using OECD Employment and Labour Market Statistics.

Conclusion



We do not know what the effects of a minimum wage at 2/3rds of median would be

A review of the international evidence, whilst useful, is unlikely to answer that question definitively

This would be uncharted territory internationally

The government would need a process in place to monitor impacts as the minimum wage rises, and adjust policy where necessary
